After a short "pawse", we have two new coordinators to head up our Feline Foster Program and our Trap-Neuter-Return Program. We are thrilled and fortunate to have these women take leadership roles within our organization.

#### Feline Foster/Adoption Program

Alethea Dudley has been a dedicated canine and feline foster family, a TNR transporter, a Dawgy Dash participant/sponsor and all-around ARK supporter for many years but taking on the title of Feline Foster Coordinator is a big new commitment. She states that she is following in her late mother Catherine Bogikes' footsteps by being active in animal rescue. When Catherine passed away, she had eight dogs who had been rescued from shelters. Catherine fostered and cared for needy dogs and cats from shelters and also assisted in animal rescue transportation. Alethea learned this compassion from her mother and is carrying on that tradition with her own family.

She will be assisted by her "crew" which consists of her three children: Zoey, Zeke and Zach. They will provide extra sets of hands to retrieve supplies, play with and socialize the young kittens and be part of the team effort in the Dudley household. Alethea adds that her goals as Feline Foster Coordinator include seeing pets going to happy homes after receiving the care they need. She intends to follow ARK's mission by spaying and neutering the pets in her care and to encourage responsible ownership.

#### **Trap-Neuter-Return Program for Stray Cats**

Mindy Beeler isn't new to Hart County. She's a native and Hart County High School graduate. But she's a new volunteer with ARK. Her devotion and affection for all things cat made her a purrfect fit for our organization. Mindy has been purchasing spay/neuter/rabies vouchers and raising funds on social media to humanely trap and fix stray cats in private agreements, so it wasn't long before we swooped in and recruited her to be our next official coordinator for the Trap-Neuter-Return program.

After getting her spayed, I didn't have the heart to just release her back on the farm with her questionable skin condition. I'd never seen anything like it before. Both her sides had open wounds with a lot of hair loss. She wasn't used to people but still allowed me to give her medicine






orally and medicate her sides. Not even the vet was sure what really happened to her. With a couple months of medicine, kindness, and a safe environment to heal she recovered beautifully. After her release, I went back out to her farm (to trap the last 2 cats) and I saw Shy Ski (short hair on left) and her sister. It made my heart happy to see them look happy and healthy.

The other cat that comes to mind is Chevy. I found Chevy with his head stuck in an old truck motor! (Why I named him Chevy!) Luckily it was near a mechanic shop; the guys there were shocked and jumped right in to help him. They had to break the part off the truck and get him inside. Then they cut his head out by hand while I held him and others held the motor part to try to keep the kitten from panicking

and moving too much. It was not a thin piece of metal. When he was finally out, it was so sweet to see these big ole country men rubbing his head and showing him some love.

ARK has been busy this spring with our fundraising efforts! On April 30, we hosted the Dawgy Dash 5K Run/Walk, and about month later, ARK assisted the Grisez family with Katie's Critter Crawl on June 4<sup>th</sup>. Both events were widely enjoyed.

The Dash nearly doubled the number of participants from the previous year and raised over \$28,000. Volunteers made sure the race was safe, well-organized, and fun.

Katie's Critter Crawl, a non-competitive walkathon held at Thelma Stovall Park, raised over \$3,200. This was the second year for the Critter Crawl. The Grisez family started this event last year to honor the memory of Katie Grisez, who lost her life in a tragic ATV accident. Katie was an animal advocate and animal lover, so her family thought it only fitting to donate the money raised at the Crawl to ARK in memory of Katie. All funds from both events will be used to benefit our four-legged friends and further ARK's work in the community.

## Hart County Animal Shelter Ribbon Cutting and SNR Voucher Sale



The Hart County Animal Shelter has been in operation for a few months, but we all are excited to have the official ribbon-cutting. On June 24, at 1:00, there will be a brief ceremony at the shelter. As part of the celebration, ARK will partner with the county to sell our popular spay-neuter-rabies vouchers from 2:00 to 4:00 at the Hart County Fairground's Floral Hall. The Hart County Fiscal Court had secured a grant from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture to finance this voucher sale. About 100 SNR vouchers will be sold for only \$25 - a special reduced price for the grand opening. Such a deal!

We are excited to have the county assist our efforts to reduce the pet overpopulation problem and encourage more people to get their pets fixed. We look forward to a bright future and partnership with the county's shelter.

## **Hot Weather Tips for Your Furry Friends**

Summer can be filled with fun activities, but the heat of summer can be brutal for your pets. Cats and dogs don't regulate their body temperatures by sweating like humans. We need to take extra care to avoid heat-related health problems. Remember these important tips:

- Don't leave animals in parked vehicles. The interior can get dangerously hot in just a few minutes, leading to heat stroke and other problems.
- Make sure your pet has plenty of shade and cool water available at all times.
- Avoid the heat of the day for exercise activities. Hot pavement can easily burn paws.
- Talk to your vet about ways to avoid ticks. If you see ticks on your pet, pull them out gently with tweezers.
- Talk to your vet about preventing fleas and mosquitos which can transmit diseases. Ask about heartworm prevention.
- Make sure you have everything your pet needs (meds, food, water, dishes) when traveling.
- Keep your pet near you for comfort if there are fireworks nearby. Don't let them run loose or they may run off.

Have fun, but not too much sun this summer with your pets. Keep everyone - furry or not - cool and comfortable.
